Road verges are critical for pollinators!

- Road verges in Wales are estimated to cover over 10,000 ha of land
- They provide important habitats for plants, small mammals and pollinators
- Provide wildlife corridors
- Traditional wildflowers on road verges provide a sense of • place

Good practice can save money

• Monmouthshire County Council saved £30,000 per year from sowing wildflowers instead of providing and maintaining annual bedding plants

Sensitive management can help wildlife and keep roads safe

• In general 2–3 cuts a year, one early; one late • Leave some grass longer; cut only once a year Allow flowering herbs to flower and set seed Prevent smothering of delicate herbs by cut grass

• Sow native wildflower mixes on roundabouts and

Existing good practice can become

• Blaenau Gwent - eleven roundabouts and road verges have been seeded with a pollinator-friendly seed mix, 1km of hedgerow has been laid, and 60m of new hedgerow

Bridgend - Wildflower mixes have been sowed on gateway

• **Denbighshire** - nine Roadside Nature Reserves are

• **Monmouthshire** – Has reduced numbers of roadside verge cuts on selective sites from seven to two per year
